

A Word From Tony

A Detour That's Not A Detour

John Piper writing on the passages in John 8 about Jesus being the Light of the world points to verses 13-29 which he says could be seen as a detour. He writes: 'The dominant focus in the apparent detour in verses 13-29, the detour away from "I am the light of the world", is that the testimony and the judgments of Jesus are true because of His relationship with God the Father. At least seven times in this passage, Jesus points to the fact that He is from the Father, and speaks on the authority of the Father, and is going to the Father, and does nothing on His own. He claims, in other words, that His authority is not owing to any human origin. It's owing to His relationship with God the Father.

Imagine the greatest human authority you can, and He is saying: I don't pretend to have that. What I claim is that I speak from God and for God and as God. I don't testify to any autonomous human greatness. What I claim in and under all I say and do, is that "I am." I am one with God, the great "I am" (Exodus 3:14). Verse 24: "Unless you believe that *I am* you will die in your sins." Verse 28: "When you have lifted up the Son of Man, then you will know that *I am*."

And the reason I say this emphasis on Jesus's relationship with the Father is not really a detour from verse 12, "I am the light of the world", is that the way Jesus is the light of the world is precisely by being one with the Father. Jesus is the light of the world because He comes from the Father and speaks for the Father and is going to the Father and is one with the Father.

So these words of interaction with the Jews look like a detour from "I am the light of the world," but in fact, they are constantly pointing to the way He is the light of the world — by coming from the Father and going to the Father and being one with the Father.'





Bible Study, Old Testament Characters – Caleb and Joshua Overcoming the Impossible – Numbers 13:26-14:10

Joshua and Caleb are two Israelite men whose stories offer an example of faithful commitment to the Lord and overcoming the impossible. Both men came out of Egypt with the Israelites through the Red Sea and into the wilderness. Joshua and Caleb were selected along with ten other men to explore the Promised Land and give a report to Moses and the people (Numbers 13:4-16 names of the 12 men).

God had promised Abraham that there would be a Promised Land for the nations to come out of his son, Isaac. The land of Canaan which the spies were to explore was the same Promised Land. Moses asked for an assessment of the geographical features of the land, the strength and numbers of the population, the agricultural potential and actual performance of the land, civic organization whether their cities were like camps or strongholds, and forestry conditions (Numbers 13:17-20). He also told them to be of good courage and to return with samples of local produce.

When ten of the twelve spies showed little faith, in the doom and gloom report they gave about the land, they were questioning and not believing what God had promised them. They did not believe that God could help them, and the people as a whole were persuaded that it was not possible to take the land. As a result, the entire nation was made to wander in the desert for 40 years, until almost the entire generation of men had died. Joshua and Caleb were the two spies who brought back a good report and believed that God would help them succeed. They were the only men from their generation permitted to go into the Promised Land after the time of wandering (Numbers 32:10-12).

The faithfulness of Joshua and Caleb teaches us that we are to stand for God even when others will not. When we do, God may choose to bless us in ways that will extend for generations to come.

Read Numbers 13:26-14:10. What report do the spies give to Moses, Aaron and the Israelite community after forty days of spying out the land (vv26-29)

How does Caleb's perspective differ from that of the majority (v30)?

What further negative information do the rest of the spies mention to oppose Caleb (vv31-33)?

How do the people react to the differing perspectives (14:1-4, 10)? Why is the temptation so great for them to return to Egypt?

Imagine that you are one of the Israelites at the border of the land God promised to give you. What thoughts and feelings would you have as you listened to both sides of this debate?

How do Joshua and Caleb respond in the midst of the tremendous unbelief of the people (vv6-9)

Due to their lack of faith in the promise and the power of God, this generation of Israelites, except for Joshua and Caleb, never entered the Promised Land (Numbers 32:10-12). How could our lack of faith prevent us from experiencing God's blessing and power in our lives?

How can the example of Caleb and Joshua encourage you to trust God more fully in one seemingly impossible situation in your life, even during these times of COVID-19?



Questions taken from 'A Life Guide Bible Study Book' by Peter Scazzero Thank you Scott for your 'Questions, Comments, Feelings' segment every Sunday morning. It is really helping us feel actively part of church.

I have decided to answer the questions here this week and would encourage anyone who would like to share their responses with the rest of the church to forward them to me and I will print them in the newsletter.

When did I first hear of Jesus?

It was at Sunday school when I was about four years of age. I remember being told I needed to ask Jesus into my heart and in my mind I did that repeatedly because even at that age I wanted a relationship with him. However, I also knew that nothing had really changed in my life until I was 14 years old and finally surrendered to Jesus in a meaningful way.

What are the differences between that first teaching and how I walk with Christ now?

At four years of age, I knew Jesus loved me but He was not my Saviour. At 14 years of age, He became my Saviour, although I did not fully understand His forgiveness of my sin. Over recent years, I have come to understand this more fully. Having a lot of thinking time in recent months, I have been reflecting on my life and become even more aware of my sinfulness and past sins and failures. In this reflection, my Lord Jesus Christ has constantly reassured me that 'there is no condemnation for those who belong to Christ Jesus' (Romans 8:1) and 'He has removed (my) sins as far from (me) as the east is from the west (Psalm 103:12).

I also have a deeper awareness of His presence constantly with me than I had all those years ago.
