What man of you, having a hundred sheep, if he loses one of them does leave the ninety nine in the wilderness and go after the one which is lost until he finds it? And when he finds it, he lays it on his shoulders rejoicing. Luke 15:4-5



Messsage From Tony The Lost Sheep

In the parable of the Lost Sheep, Jesus invites His listeners to place themselves into the story with, "Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep." In doing this Jesus is appealing to their reasoning and life experiences. As the story completes, the Pharisees in their pride refuse to see themselves as shameful "sinners," but eagerly take the honouring label of being "righteous." However, by the implication of their own pride, they place themselves in the position of being the less significant group, the ninety-nine: "There will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who do not need to repent." It can be rightly assumed that there is a bit of sarcasm in the reference to the Pharisees "who do not need to repent" (see Romans 3:23).

A closer examination of the parable shows that Jesus was turning His listeners' understanding of things upside down. The Pharisees saw themselves as being the beloved of God and the "sinners" as unclean. Jesus uses the Pharisees' prejudices against them, while encouraging the sinners with one clear message. That message is this: God has a tender, personal concern ("and when he finds it, he puts it on his shoulders," v. 5). God has a joyous love for individuals who are lost (in sin) and are found (repent). Jesus makes it clear that the Pharisees, who thought they were close to God, were actually distant and those sinners and tax collectors were the ones God was seeking after.

We see this same message in Luke 18:9-14. There, Jesus is teaching on attitudes of prayer, but the problem He is addressing is the same as in Luke 15. In Luke 18:14 Jesus provides the conclusion for us: "I tell you, this man went home justified (before God) rather than the others; for everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

4 I'm sitting in His presence, The sunshine of His face, While with adoring wonder His blessings I retrace: It seems as if eternal days Are far too short to sound His praise. (Chorus)

This hymn was written by Walton W Spenser, a missionary who worked in Durban South Africa in the 19th century. About 1889, W. Spencer Walton founded The Sailor's Rest where he ministered to the spiritual needs of seaman. During the Boer War, he distributed Bibles to the English soldiers. Spencer Walton's work is known mainly through the books and pamphlets he wrote. He is also credited with this one hymn published in 1894.

BARBERSHOPS - Haircuts and bloodletting

Do you know why some barbershops have a red, white and blue spiral pole attached to their storefronts?

During the middle ages, dentistry and some medicine in Europe was practiced by 'barber-surgeons'. These community professionals served townspeople by performing a wide variety of services from cutting hair to extracting teeth to bloodletting. The colours of the pole represent red for bloodletting, white for bandages and blue for non-oxygenated blood.

For hundreds of years, physicians would bleed people with fevers and other symptoms, believing such patients had too much blood. (Light bleeding was often accompanied by leeches.) Gradualy dentistry and surgery were taken over by specialists and the barber was left with only his scissors and comb.

Jesus allowed the blood to pour from his body so that we might receive spiritual healing.

'He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities; the chastisement of our peace was upon Him, and by His stripes we are healed.' Isaiah 53:5

<u>Bible Study, Old Testament Characters – Esther Saying 'Yes' to God – Esther 4:1-17</u>

We often find it easy to obey God when there is little risk or cost involved. However, when God prompts us to speak to a stranger about Christ, to take an unpopular position on a moral issue (such as abortion or homosexuality), or to take a step of faith into the unknown, we can often become indecisive.

Four centuries before Christ, Esther found herself at a similar fork in the road with only two options before her: to offer herself as God's instrument or to deny her identity as one of God's people.

Prior to the study, read Esther chapters 1 to 3 to gain an understanding of the context.


In what situations do you find it difficult to openly confess or obey the Lord?

Read Esther 4:1-17. How do Mordecai and the Jews in the provinces react to the edict of the king (vv. 1-3)?

What steps does Esther take to comfort Mordecai and understand his distress (vv.4-5)?

Describe the message Mordecai gives to Esther through the king's servant Hathach (vv. 6-9).

Why is Esther reluctant to heed Mordecai's exhortation (vv. 10,11)?






A letter recently received from a man call Ramu:
