<u>Bible Study, New Testament Characters – Mary Magdalene</u> <u>Loving Jesus In Practical Ways – Luke 8:1-3; Mark 15:37-47;</u> John 20:1-18

Twelve men followed Jesus. They are so well known that children recite their names. But Jesus had women following him too. Some are nameless. Others appear with their sons. And some walk through the pages of Scripture with their names intact.

These women also assisted in Christ's work. They too learned from his teachings. They showed their love for Jesus in practical ways. Mary Magdalene was one of them.

GROUP DISCUSSION – What are some practical ways that you have seen people express love?


Mary Magdalene was one of a substational number of women who followed Jesus and helped to care for his needs and the needs of others who travelled with him. Her story is told in small snippets spread throughout the Gospels. Read Luke 8:1-3; Mark 15:37-47; John 20:1-18.

In view of all that you have read here, what kind of person is Mary Magdalene?

Focus on Luke 8:1-3. What do these verses reveal about Mary Magdalene? (Consider her past, her work, her friends)

Focus on Mark 15:37-47. Why do you think Mary Magdalene chose to be present at Christ's death?

What would she have seen and heard and learned and felt as she watched Christ Die?

PU'UHONUA - City of Refuge

On the largest isaland in Hawaii ancient ruins of a village stand with a large oblong temple and a wall 1,000 feet long. The wall was built from 1,550 chunks of lava and measures 18 feet thick at the base and stands 12 feet high. The temple village was called 'Pu'uhonua' - or City of Refuge.

In ancient times, when a native Hawaiian broke one of the 'kapu' or sacred laws, he was sentenced to death unless he could flee to this village where he could seek refuge and forgiveness. Once inside the walls of the village, he was safe and protected from judgement. Later a priest would perform a rite of purification for the guilty party. He would then be declared forgiven and was free to begin a new life.

Jesus is the place of refuge for anyone who desires to be saved and receive forgiveness for their sins, and start a new life. He willingly endured the cross as a substitute in the sinners place.

'He has delivered us from the power of darkness and conveyed us into the kingdom of the Son of His love, in whom we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins.' Colossians 1:13-14

Partners in Bible Translation

In the world today, there are at least 285 million people who are blind or vision impaired. Developing nations in Africa and Asia have a higher incidence of eye conditions and vision impairment. The Philippines is a country with over half a million blind or vision impaired people. In early 2019 Wycliffe was part of a pilot project with Resources for the Blind Philippines (RBI), using the Bloom Reader to create digital books for the blind and those with visual impairments.

Bloom was developed by SIL International as easy-to-use software for creating books and translating them into multiple languages. People with limited computer skills can easily create literacy materials for their own minority language groups. Bloom is open-source software, making it accessible for more people throughout the world. In addition to books that the general language community can access, Bloom enables groups which are often marginalised to access literature and Scripture.

The books also needed to be recorded as 'talking books', including the image descriptions.


Many children who were previously unable to access reading materials can now read books and Bible stories and share them with their families. They may not have 20/20 vision but they do have a bright future ahead.
