Living The Kingdom Life

Matthew 7

A. Introduction

- 1. Matt 7 presents practical teachings on living as citizens of God's Kingdom.
- 2. They emphasize a righteousness that exceeds mere outward behaviour.
- 3. It calls for deep heart transformation that results in true holiness, wisdom, and spiritual fruitfulness.

B. Judging Others (Matthew 7:1-6)

- 1. The measure we use to judge others will be used against us.
- 2. We are all fallen and in need of grace.
- 3. He condemns hypocritical judgment, where people criticize small flaws in others while ignoring their own larger faults (See Lev 19:15; Rom 2:1).
- 4. True humility and self-awareness are required for right understanding of others.
- 5. Jesus advises discernment when sharing the gospel.
- 6. Not everyone is open to or worthy of hearing it.
- 7. Care should be taken to avoid judgmental attitudes, let God's grace shape us.

C. Asking, Seeking, Knocking (Matthew 7:7-11)

- 1. Jesus encourages persistent prayer, saying that God, like a loving Father, will give good gifts to those who ask (vv. 7-8).
- 2. This demonstrates God's goodness and provision.
- 3. Unlike earthly fathers, God always responds with what is best for us.

D. The Golden Rule (Matthew 7:12)

- 1. "Do to others what you would have them do to you."
- 2. He claims this to be the fulfillment of the law.
- 3. This principle extends beyond avoidance of harm to actively seeking good.
- 4. We are called to love others as we desire to be loved.

E. The Narrow and Wide Gates (Matthew 7:13-14)

- 1. Jesus calls His followers to enter through the narrow gate, the path that leads to eternal life but is difficult and requires sacrifice (vv. 13-14).
- 2. The wide gate, representing the easier path, leads to destruction.
- 3. True discipleship demands a deliberate commitment.
- 4. Following Jesus is not easy or popular, but leads to the reward of eternal life.
- 5. The narrow path is the way of life.
- 6. We are called to love everyone, not just those who are easy to love.

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F. True and False Prophets (Matthew 7:15-20)

- 1. Jesus warns against false teachers who appear sincere but lead others astray.
- 2. Discernment is key, as false prophets often disguise their true intentions.
- 3. The true test of a prophet's legitimacy is the fruit they produce.
- 4. Good trees bear good fruit, and bad trees bear bad fruit.
- 5. Likewise, a teacher's character, message, and life must align with God's truth.
- 6. Believers must also examine their own lives, striving to bear good fruit.

G. True and False Disciples (Matthew 7:21-23)

- 1. Jesus teaches that calling Him "Lord" is not enough (v. 21).
- 2. True discipleship involves doing the will of God, not merely professing faith.
- 3. Many will claim to have done works in Jesus' name but will be rejected.
- 4. Their lives did not reflect true obedience (vv. 22-23).
- 5. Authentic discipleship is marked by a transformed heart and life.

H. The Wise and Foolish Builders (Matthew 7:24-27)

- 1. Jesus compares the wise builder to the foolish builder.
- 2. One hears and obeys, while the other hears but does not act
- 3. The wise builder's life is stable and enduring, even in the face of storms.
- 4. The foolish builder's life crumbles because they fail to apply Jesus' teachings.

I. Conclusion

- 1. The Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7) challenges believers to live according to the values of God's Kingdom.
- 2. True discipleship involves more than words.
- 3. It requires commitment, humility, discernment, and obedience to God's will.
- 4. Following Jesus means walking the narrow path.
- 5. We build our lives on His solid teachings, and are transformed by His grace.
- 6. The Christian life is a life of active love, spiritual fruitfulness, and deep relationship with God.
- 7. Choosing to follow the narrow path may be difficult, but it leads to eternal life, a reward worth pursuing.
