Come and Find Rest

Matthew 11:25-30

A. How Do We Find Rest In God?

- 1. Jesus starts with praise (Matthew 11:25-26)
- 2. God reveals truth to those with childlike faith, not the self-sufficient or arrogant.
- 3. Jesus praises God's sovereignty in revealing truth to those who truly seek Him.
- 4. True understanding of God comes from a heart open to His revelation.

B. Our Inviting Lord

- 1. Our Lord's invitations are expressions of His love to both saints and sinners.
- 2. The first invitation in the New Testament to the weary to find rest.
- 3. Jesus is speaking to a weary people burdened by religious legalism.
- 4. They were worn down by life's struggles, just as we all get tired & weary.

C. An Invitation to Physical Rest (v. 28)

- 1. The invitation is to "all you that labour".
- 2. Jesus identifies with working people.
 - a. He knows about long hours of hard labour.
 - b. Jesus spoke of sowers, shepherds, fishermen, etc.
 - c. He chose hard-working men to be His disciples.
- 3. Are you tired, wondering how to find strength to go on?
 - a. Jesus understands and cares.
 - b. He offers strength to you. (Isa. 40:31 & Phil. 4:13)
- 4. Those who come to Jesus find rest.
 - a. They find strength in worship.
 - b. They can be refreshed by resting in Him.

D. An Invitation to Emotional Rest (v. 28)

- 1. The invitation is to those who "are heavy laden".
- 2. Emotional burdens drain our strength, make us tired, robs us of energy.
- 3. Those who are heavy laden with cares find rest in Christ.
- 4. In any & every situation, He is the great problem solver.
 - a. We can cast our cares on Him. (1 Peter 5:7)
 - b. He gives peace when we are troubled. (John 14:27)
 - c. His peace guards our hearts. (Phil. 4:6-7)
 - d. His grace is sufficient for all our needs. (2 Cor. 12:9)
- 5. He gives us the promise of rest. "My yoke is easy, and my burden is light"
- 6. We can see the contrasting burdens being on offer.
- 7. The Pharisees place heavy religious burdens, but Jesus offers freedom & peace.
- 8. True rest comes through surrender, not striving.

E. An Invitation to Spiritual Rest

- 1. Our souls never rest until they rest in Him
- 2. We try works, religious ritual, etc. but trying to keep the law exhausts us.
- 3. Only Christ brings rest. [Note pronouns me, I, my, me, I, my, & my in v28-30]
- 4. Faith comes not by works or ritual but by faith (Eph. 2:8-9)

F. Come to Jesus, and Find Complete Rest in Him

- 1. This is a call to the weary, a personal invitation to relationship, not religion.
- 2. He is inviting all who are weary & burdened by sin, legalism, & life's struggles.
- 3. Jesus promises to give true rest—peace, salvation, and freedom.
- 4. Yoke has a variety of meanings, usually teamwork, submission, or guidance.
- 5. So, to be yoked to Jesus is to serve and follow Him.
- 6. Everyone is yoked to someone or something. What do you want to be yoked to?
- 7. Some are yoked to the power of sin. They are under its control.
- 8. (See Galatians 5:1; 1 Timothy 6:1-2; & Isaiah 58:6)
- 9. Jesus releases the yoke of oppression & helps us to take on His yoke instead.
- 10. Why not avoid yokes altogether and do our own thing?
- 11. Ironically, there is a comfort in being "yoked" to something or someone.
- 12. Two oxen are chosen to share a yoke. The first is an older ox, trained & hardy.
- 13. The second is a new young ox. He has potential but is inexperienced.
- 14. The elder trains the young by sharing the same yoke with a veteran workhorse.
- 15. The more experienced one also draws harder to bear the majority of the load.
- 16. This very much resembles discipleship. Jesus invites us to 'learn from Him.'
- 17. This is another way of stating, 'be my disciple.' The paraphrase?
- 18. "Be yoked with me. Let me disciple You. I'll bear the weight of your burden. My yoke is good & you will find rest as we work together."

G. Those Yoked with Christ by Faith Enjoy Serving Him

- 1. Jesus is gentle and humble in heart, & He invites us to learn from Him.
- 2. He is offering a different kind of leadership than the world.
- 3. Surrender to Jesus means walking in obedience while experiencing His grace.
- 4. We see the authority of Jesus (Matthew 11:27)
- 5. Jesus declares His unique relationship with the Father a Divine Sonship.
- 6. Trusting Jesus means acknowledging His supreme authority.
- 7. That trust then invites us to seek Him for wisdom and guidance.

H. Conclusion

- 1. Jesus reveals truth to the humble.
- 2. He alone has the authority to bring us to the Father.
- 3. He invites the weary to come, take His yoke, and find rest.
- 4. Are you weary? Come to Jesus today.
- 5. Are you trying to carry burdens alone? Surrender them to Him.
- 6. Trust in Jesus for true and lasting rest.
